











Violent Crime Rates per 1,000 Population Baffin Region Communities, 1992.








Small villages between 500 residents to small city municipalities of up to 15,000 residents that are not directly connected to an urban metropolis.

Canada and Australia's commonalities

- Rural crime rates higher than urban crime rates
- Large indigenous population
- Incentives for rural "stints"
- Local capacity to respond to issues is lacking




North Battleford, Canada

- Population 14,000
- Highest Crime Severity Index in Canada
- Violence and disorder

Let's just see what tomorrow brings

- Homeless shelter and community garden
- Downtown revitalization
- Intersection mural
- Community survey



Roma, Queensland

- Population 6,800 people
- Crime rate approx. 12,000 per 100,000 people
- Issues with youth crime and violence
- Mental health and suicide





Learnings from the rural landscape

- Cohesion is assumed
 WITHIN rural communities
 but this does not translate
 to action
- Loss of brainpower and local leaders
- The commonwealth and willingness to take ownership
